


## **Australia's world heritage**

There are over 750 cultural or natural sites in the UNESCO world heritage list. A lot of the sites in Europe are of cultural importance - the Tower of London, for example, or Berlin's Museum Island, or the historic centre of Vienna. By contrast, Australia's fifteen sites are places of great natural beauty, such as the Barrier Reef or Uluru (Ayer's Rock). They also include the Central Eastern Rainforest, which was nominated in 1987. Today, five percent of the Australian continent is covered by forest, compared with ten percent two hundred years ago. And only a little of this area is actually rainforest, about 0.3 percent of the country. But the rainforests are Australia's most important biological resource - home to over half of its plants and animals. In the past, rainforests have been cut down for commercial profit. The nomination of the Central Eastern Rainforest as a world heritage site was a milestone in the campaign to protect them.



# Grass roots voices

Ian and Sara Harvey were at Newcastle's Civic Centre last Monday to hear Dr. Jane Bell's lecture on the ecological footprint. Afterwards, they used a scoresheet to calculate their footprint size. Here's what they have to say.



lan Well, we certainly got a lot of information. Dr. Bell made it clear that there is only a little space available for every person. Just 1.8 hectares. And how many hectares is my footprint? 6.2, I'm afraid. Well,

our house is rather big – we have a large number of rooms – although my wife and I really don't need so much space. And I've got a lot of bad habits. I normally shower for about 30 minutes a day, although I know that in some parts of the world, there is hardly any water. I feel bad about that. And if everyone used a car as often as I do, we'd have no oil left by the middle of the century. Dr. Bell had plenty of helpful suggestions for saving our resources – don't change your clothes every day, buy lots of locally produced food, eat less meat, go on holiday near your home, etc. If I'm honest, I probably won't make many changes to my lifestyle. But I'd like to try.



**Sara** OK, my footprint – 7.9 hectares – is quite big. But I didn't hear many practical suggestions about how to make it smaller. If I don't use my car, it doesn't mean that we'll have fewer roads. And anyway,

there are no bus stops near our house. So there isn't much sense in that. It's easy for someone like Dr. Bell to suggest using a bike. How much time does she think I've got? Scientists say we're using too much land – but is that really true? I think we have plenty of space – I mean, look at Scotland – it's practically empty except for one or two big cities like Glasgow and Edinburgh. OK, so I'd hate to live there, with so many cows and sheep and only a few people .... But seriously, there are too many pessimists around today and I don't have a great deal of patience with them. Hardly any of the terrible predictions I've heard have ever come true.
