Interviewer: OK. So, the first thing I always think when I hear about cruises is - with all that time at sea in between ports, is it not a little bit boring?

Cruise Company: Yes, a lot of people say that. They think that with so much time at sea, there will be nothing to do, but actually most people find there is too much to do! Ships today are like huge hotels. They are almost like small towns. There are swimming pools, shops, you can play golf, go to the gym, or you can even go rock climbing on some ships! And of course, when you arrive, there are excursions and places to visit. You could see several countries in a just a few weeks.

Interviewer: But aren't cruises expensive?

Cruise Company rep: People often think that cruises are expensive, but actually cruises offer great value for money because so much is included. As well as accommodation in your cabin, most cruises offer food, drinks, entertainment and, of course, the travel between your destinations. Some cruise ships even give you free money you can spend on board ship.

Interviewer: Free money?

Cruise Company rep: Yes, that's right – free money! It's called on board credit. It's like a bonus. You can earn onboard credit in lots of way. For example, by booking another cruise, or booking your cruise early or because the travel agent has a special offer. You can spend it on anything that isn't included and you can use it on excursions, too.

Interviewer: So, do you give me money to go on a cruise?

Cruise Company rep: Well, not exactly. It's not cash. It's currency you can

spend on the ship. You don't get the money back if you don't spend it, I'm afraid!

Interviewer: I have to admit, it all sounds pretty good, but there is a slight problem. My wife gets really seasick. I don't think she'd want to be on a ship for too long!

Cruise Company rep: Well, if she doesn't like spending too long at sea, there are always river cruises. A lot of the river boats now have many of the same facilities you find on the big cruise ships. They have balconies and bars to sit in and watch the towns and countryside go by. I can't think of a more relaxing way to spend my time.
