

3 Worksheet on Visual Literacy: Describing People

Pictures in Peter Freese, *New York*, Viewfinder Topics (München: Langenscheidt, 2011), pp. 6, 13, 20, 37, 43.

In the Bavarian Abitur examinations (and in some other Bundesländer, too), you have to take an oral exam. Among other things, you might have to describe people. These exercises will help you get prepared.

Daughter (looking at a photo album): Mum, who is the tall, handsome, dark-haired man?

Mother: That's your father.

Daughter: Then who's that fat, bald guy living with us?

A VOCABULARY TO DESCRIBE PEOPLE

1 DESCRIBING PEOPLE - PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

When describing people, think about the following categories:

Age old (e.g. senior citizen), middle-aged, young, teenager, baby, toddler, elderly, in her 40s, in his 50s etc.

Build fat, overweight, obese, stocky, slim, muscular, athletic, well-proportioned, thin, plump, fat, skinny, well-built, underweight etc.

Colouring pale, Caucasian, black, Asian, Mediterranean, blonde, dark, red-haired, dark-skinned etc.

Face oval, heart-shaped, square, round; forehead, chin, skin, eyebrows, (broad or narrow) nose, (regular) teeth, (hooked) nose, cheekbones, with scars, wrinkles, freckles; sun-tanned, pale etc.

Hair	long, short, curly, straight, think, wavy, bald, spiky (or spikey), dark, blonde, dark-haired etc.
Clothes	casual, slovenly dressed, shabby, smart, tidy, messy, business style

2 DESCRIBING PEOPLE – CHARACTER
