# **TEACHER TRAINING AND OTHER TEACHER RESOURCES**



Resources are a click (and a step) away. Find out about sites on the Internet which can help you develop as a teacher. And discover your local teaching association, offering a lively programme of activities for teachers like you.

### 1 TeachingEnglish

One of the best websites for teacher development, *TeachingEnglish*, is run by the British Council in conjunction with the BBC. It offers a wealth of teaching tips, and more importantly, teacher development ideas. You can find lots of practical information and guidance about how to progress with your teaching; read and download top stories from the world of teaching; register for webinars (miniconferences on the Internet which you watch on your computer) and gather valuable information about how you can develop yourself professionally. There are also many easily accessible links to professional journals, blogs and videos of teacher seminars. And you can find articles on all aspects of teaching: methodology, resources, pronunciation, vocabulary, speaking, reading, listening, writing, literature and culture.

There is also a vast treasure trove of lesson plans, activities and teaching tips. Have you always wondered how to use songs in the classroom? Or what about using mobile devices, like smartphones, in one of your lessons? What about a lesson all about scenic Dorset in southern England? And how about using card games in a lesson?

Lesson plans are graded from A2 to C1, so there is sure to be something of use for users of *Network Now*.

Another useful resource on the site is BritLit, where you can download a text and student worksheets to use literature in the classroom.

or adults. You can also read reviews from other teachers.

You can browse the activities by target age, topic, language level, time, main focus (reading, speaking etc.), language aim (adverbs, prepositions, past simple etc.) or materials (what you will need for the lesson). - Try the lesson 'Wat song r u listening 2?' using a video made in New York. Its target group is A1 and A2, teen or adults. This could be just the thing for your class!

#### 3 Local teaching association (ELTA)

If you would like some support for your professional development, but you don't want to sit in front of the computer, then why not join your **local teaching association**? Under the umbrella of the International Association of Teachers of English as a Foreign Language (IATEFL) based in the UK, **local teaching associations** have been established around the world. Germany is particularly well-served, currently having eight English Teaching Associations (or **ELTA**s); Switzerland has one national **ELTA** and so does Austria.

**ELTA**s are a great way to meet other teachers and to keep in touch with what is going on in the world of English language training. There are events and workshops throughout the year often lead by well-known ELT names.
